



Bar and Bat Mitzvahs







Eid al-Fitr (pronounced ed œl fIt-Ur) is an important religious holiday for the world's two billion Muslims. Eid al-Fitr, or Eid, is the first day after Ramadan, a month of **fasting**. On this day, Muslims say **prayers** and have a special meal. Children open presents. Many people give to the poor or donate money to charities, an important part of the religion.



CATRINA

a Catrina is one of the most popular symbols of the Day of the Dead in Mexico. What is La Catrina? It's a skeleton of a woman in an elegant hat and a long formal dress.

La Catrina is the invention of a famous Mexican illustrator, Jose Guadalupe Posada, just before the Mexican Revolution. He drew La Catrina in 1910 to make fun of **wealthy** Mexicans who imitated European styles. Posada took his inspiration from Mictecacihuatl (mlk-tEk-si-wa-t'l), the Aztec goddess of death and queen of the underworld. Posada only illustrated the head of La Catrina in 1910. In 1947, the Mexican artist Diego Rivera painted a full-length view of La Catrina in the mural "Dream of a Sunday Afternoon in Alameda Park."

Nowadays, some people wear costumes to look like La Catrina, even outside of Mexico.

powwow was once an important gathering to negotiate peace between tribes. The name powwow comes similar-sounding from Narragansett word for a healing ceremony. Now the word powwow refers to a type of American Indian gathering that is common in Canada and the United States. At powwows, people of American Indian heritage meet to socialize, dance, sing and honor their cultures.

A powwow usually starts with a parade of dancers in colorful traditional clothing. The clothing has beautiful designs made with beads and feathers. Then there is singing and dancing to the beat of a drum. Later, there are dancing competitions for men and women. There are also stands where you can buy traditional food, such as grilled corn, fry bread and venison or bison. There are also modern snacks like hot dogs, pizza and lemonade.



Powwows can last for one day, or for up to a week if it is a special occasion. They can be at any time of the year. 129 And they aren't just for American Indians—they're open to everyone. It's a great time to learn about different tribal cultures. There are a few rules you should follow if you go to a powwow: First, it's OK to wear regular clothes to a powwow. Please don't dress up like an "Indian." But please do wear clothing that is modest and respectful. Many powwows take place during the summer, but no swimsuits please! Lastly, remember to have fun! It's a celebration, after all!
